President's Report

I thought that I would share with you some statistics from my attendances at the Road Safety Advisory Council over the past few years.

These are organized at request of the Roads and Maritime Minister and they take place in the Transport for NSW building in Railway Square.

The Hon, Duncan Gay began the meetings when he was Minister and his successor has continued them on.

The current Minister, the Hon. Melinda Pavey MP attends and always gives us her full attention plus speaks very highly of the work being carried out.

There are usually around 20 people in attendance and they are from all groups who make use of our roads. From cyclists to heavy vehicles and even pedestrians.

I am there representing all motoring enthusiasts within the club movement on behalf of the Australian Confederation of Motor Clubs Inc (ACMC) which the CMC is a member of.

Just the statistics and facts that stood out in my mind and brought home the fact that we in NSW are doing better as far as saving lives on our roads.

For example, over the past seven years, if things had remained as they were in 2009 we would have had 700 extra people die and 3,500 more suffering from major injuries.

The changes made to rules and regulations plus much better roads have contributed to these people being alive and well today and not underground or in hospital.

All that despite the population of NSW climbing by 800,000 and the number of vehicles registered climbing by over 1,000,000. Yes, that is one million more vehicles in NSW in just seven years.

It is worrying that the deaths and serious injuries amongst drivers and passengers in the 50 to 79 year old age group is one of the areas which is increasing.

Up by an average of 5 to 6% each year so this needs a lot of work to find out why and hopefully slow down the trend.

Most other sectors such as young men and women are on the decrease so why are we older folks getting killed or hurt badly more often?

An interesting detail came from the senior Police Officer who attends these meetings. He recently attended a conference in Texas USA.

That state is very large, as they will all tell you, and it has a similar population to all of Australia. So just one state of the USA has as many people as Australia has in the entire place.

In Texas they have no RBT, no MDT, no helmet laws and very liberal interpretation of speed limits on their roads.

Great deal I hear you say. But wait, road deaths in Texas are close to three times that of all of Australia in any given year.

So the rules and regulations we live with throughout this country are saving lives if those facts and figures are any indication. Literally thousands per year it would seem.

And when we look at the statistics for road deaths per 100,000 residents, the states of NSW and Victoria are doing the best with figures of around 4.8 in the previous year. Looking similar for 2017 as well.

That compares to a National average of 4.95 deaths per 100,000 and the worst figure in the country of 9 in the NT.

Sobering thought is that in NSW we actually have figures of 2.2 in the city areas and 8.75 in country areas. That indicates that travelling in the country is more dangerous. No great surprise there I suppose.

Could be due to the condition of the roads or fatigue and many other factors but it must be changed. Much more work has to happen.

The Pacific Highway north to Qld is now 80% dual carriageway and will be 100% by 2020 they tell us. That is the sort of infrastructure we need in this state, not money spent on other things I suggest.

May I take this opportunity to wish all CMC member clubs and those members and families within those clubs the very best for the coming festive season.

Please take care on our roads as we certainly want to see you at events in 2018.

The Local Car Industry

I am bemused with all the hysteria and emotion associated with the demise of the local car industry. There was a hue and cry about Holden's original announcement, which followed Ford's earlier one - and then subsequently followed by Toyota.

The media coverage was intense with politicians, union officials and anybody who had ever owned a car expressing their opinions with vigour and emotion. Numbers were being quoted of jobs lost directly and indirectly within the industry and the enormous repercussions that would emanate from the closure. There were all the usual arguments for and against further government support and everybody had an opinion.

And it's on again now that Holden are building their last car here. Frankly, I was impressed how the obvious was handled. Firstly, the acknowledgement that we cannot keep making cars and secondly, four years notice! I have never heard of a company telling an employee that you will not be required in four years. Not next week or next month – in four years! Amazing stuff. The reality is that it is not a viable industry here.

However, there was a far bigger manufacturing industry in this country that died the same way, but nobody cared. Nobody was even bothered to talk about it. The home appliance industry was many times bigger than the automotive industry! Think about some of the brands that were manufacturing products here:

Kelvinator, Westinghouse, Malleys/Whirlpool, Hoover, Hotpoint, Metters, Sunbeam, Crosley, Simpson, Frigidaire, Philips,

St George, Chef, Wonderheat, Vulcan, GE

And several of them had been around for 100 years.

Malleys alone, had almost as many direct employees as GMH and used more steel and paint! With factories in Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia it also had a huge base of component suppliers as did all the other brands and many industries grew up from supplying the appliance industry and went on to add the automotive side to their business. The biggest manufacturing group was in appliances.

So what is all the fuss about a few car makers?

They got all the press and a higher profile because there is obviously more emotion and attachment concerning motor vehicles than washing machines or refrigerators. That public interest is reflected in the number of magazines, TV shows and press reports associated with cars. People love their cars. Not a lot of emotional attachment to dishwashers....

Because you can get more appliances into a container than vehicles, that industry went first. And it went quietly without a whimper or comment from politicians, unions or the public. Time to get real about the situation. It happened before in a much bigger industry and the country still prospered. Remember that we are trying to build things for the entire country with a population about the same as New York State. That's what happens – its evolution – we adapt and move on.

SSC Track Run Etiquette & Other Matters

Some club members at the 2017 SSC felt the need to 'demonstrate' their skills (or lack of them) behind the wheel by dropping back to the rear of a track run and proceeding to perform 'wheelies', or they just feel the need to put their foot down.

The SSC is NOT a speed event and it's certainly not conducive to drifting or other types of similar behaviour. Our CAMS Permit and the insurance attached to it does not cover us if there is an incident because of 'undue practices' on the track during a track run.

Infringements of this kind are not only bothersome to everyone else on the track but, they can cause your club to be banned from attending future events. If things do not improve we may have to cancel the track tours. If we were to make it a speed event you would all need CAMS track licenses and have your vehicles scrutineered before going out on track. I am sure that none of you want that. So, please make sure your members are aware of the limits placed on us by the CAMS Permit Insurance and the ARDC, who are responsible for the track activities overall on the day. Drivers and riders must understand the need to respect other drivers and keep to the speed limits. No overtaking is one rule which is chiselled in stone.

SSC Volunteers

A few of our Volunteers at the 2017 SSC were on the receiving end of some unacceptable behaviour by club members. Our volunteers donate their time to make sure the event runs smoothly and should not be subjected to any kind of bad behaviour or abuse. Please treat our Volunteers as you would wish to be treated. If any of your members have an issue with one of the Volunteers please report the incident and allow the Committee to deal with it.

Just a couple of points to remember when a member of your club wishes to place his modified vehicle on the CVS (Classic Vehicle Scheme):

- If they are posting their paperwork please DO NOT include original Blue Slips or Engineering Paperwork. A copy will suffice. If these documents are lost in the mail the club member has the extra cost of new documents plus the time and inconvenience of a having to organise them yet again.
- If and EFT receipt for the \$25 administration fee is emailed with the Declaration and copy Blue Slip it will speed the process up by as much as 48 hours. Without an EFT receipt I need to wait for the payment to show up on the ACMC bank statement.

Luxury Car Tax & Asbestos

TWO ISSUES AFFECTING THE IMPORTATION OF HERITAGE & HISTORIC VEHICLES

LUXURY CAR TAX AND ASBESTOS

1. Luxury Car Tax (LCT) - vehicles imported into Australia are subject to a Luxury Car Tax irrespective of their age or heritage value. The LCT was introduced to protect Australian car manufacturers from overseas competition. The threshold at which the LCT commences is currently A\$64,132 – but the "LC Value", includes the cost of freight and insurance for bringing the car to Australia, and GST. The LCT also applies to the re-importation of vehicles taken out of Australia, if when they are overseas, they are subjected to any "treatment, repair, renovation, alteration or any other process". This applies even if ownership does not change.

The AOMC in Victoria submitted to a Senate Enquiry in 2008 that "Unfortunately, and probably due to no more than oversight, the advent of Luxury Car Tax did not acknowledge this category of exemption (no Customs duty on cars over 30 years old) and imposed a barrier to the bringing of historic vehicles to Australia. Moreover, in the past two or three decades the historic vehicle fleet in this country once recognised as one of the finest in the world, with many examples of the rarest survivors from the first forty years of motoring history has been decimated. Hundreds, perhaps thousands, of early vehicles have been shipped to buyers from countries with stronger currencies, such as the UK, Europe and the US. Those local enthusiasts who may have wished to redress such depredation in a small way have faced prohibitive cost barriers due to the impact of GST and LCT. LCT does not apply to domestic sales of old vehicles, its application to imports is inconsistent and has simply made worse the net losses of our pool of historic vehicles........ The impact of LCT on the movement has been to restrict Australia's access to the middle and upper strata of old vehicles, the very ones that we have lost most of in the one-way traffic out of the country. They are also the very ones that act in the same way as elite athletes do for mainstream participation in sport; they act as the beacons to inspire and attract new, younger people to the movement".

Unfortunately the AOMC's submission nor any since have failed to persuade the Commonwealth Government to withdraw the LCT for heritage, historic or collector vehicles. However, the Museums and Galleries lobby group have achieved remarkable success, as on 28 February 2017, laws were passed which resulted in them being able to import for display purposes only cars over 30 years old without having to pay customs duty, GST, or LCT. 2. Asbestos in imported vehicles. Asbestos has been a prohibited import into Australia since December 2003. Asbestos causes Mesothelioma – an aggressive cancer that develops in the lining of the lungs, abdomen, or heart. Caused by asbestos, mesothelioma has no known cure and has a very poor prognosis. Border Protection (BP) is responsible for ensuring that asbestos does not enter Australia, there has been no change in Border Protection's processes however they elevated their efforts from March 2017 in monitoring that imported motor vehicles are asbestos free.

Veteran, vintage, post-vintage, heritage or historic vehicles being imported into Australia require a declaration that they do not contain asbestos parts and may require a testing certificate from an approved test facility to support that. Intending importers should to have asbestos-based vehicle parts replaced before the vehicles are imported into Australia and replaced with non-asbestos items before shipping, they should also require from vendors adequate documentation, assurances and testing – including new replacement items. Failure to do so risks vehicle detention, extra costs and possible fines and seizure of the vehicle for disposal, re-export is not permitted.

Items on vehicles that might be of concern include: Asbestos tape; Brake linings or blocks; Clutch linings or brake disc pads; Diaphragms; Electrical cloth and tapes; Friction materials for, or within, internal combustion and electric motor vehicles (for example, clutch linings, brake pads and shoes and gaskets); Gaskets or seals; Lagging and jointing materials; Mastics, sealants, putties or adhesives. Note that goods manufactured outside Australia might be labelled "asbestos free" and still contain a low amount or certain types of asbestos. Such goods will not be permitted for import into Australia.

Following a meeting in March 2017 between Border Force, DIBP, the Freight and Trade Alliance and Customs Brokers and Forwarders Council of Australia where the difficulties experienced with the management of the asbestos ban for vehicles were raised, it was decided that an industry workshop be organised.

Meanwhile circulating in the movement are a number of unsubstantiated stories of historic vehicles being dismantled by Border Protection with consequent loss of parts and considerable expense incurred by the owners. However, there is one published account that warrants attention – Michael Sheehan at Ferraris Online. This details the recent experiences of two owners with Mustangs and DKW, and indicates that they incurred costs resulting from inspection damage and costs to replace seized parts, plus significant other costs – storage and professional.

That asbestos is so dangerous that it is banned in vehicles is presumably not the issue. The problems seem to be with the experiences at import processing points, and with owners unaware that the asbestos checking would occur or be so detailed, and with costs, paperwork and procedural complications. Possibly what is required are: 1. Vehicle inspection and certification processes that are cost-effective for historic vehicle owners. 2. Inspections that are respectful of the rarity, value and/or heritage/preservation features of the vehicle and so are undertaken with or by relevant specialists. 3. Information programs that explain the asbestos-free requirements in plain English and are readily available to prospective owners and importers of historic vehicles and circulated widely in the movement.

Both Luxury Car Tax and Asbestos in imported vehicles have serious implications for the collector car movement in Australia, hampering the importation of interesting, exotic, rare or more mundane heritage and historic vehicles into Australia, and similarly hindering the repatriation back to Australia of our unique heritage vehicles. 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

Guidelines for Club Committee Hand-over & How to Download Minutes & Magazines

These details should be kept with your Club Secretary or Public Officer and handed to the new Committee following your AGM or at a time immediately following any committee changes.

The Committee of the CMC has identified some issues around club contact details, which are stored on our database, as being incorrect. This means some emails aren't getting to some of our clubs.

If you aren't getting emails from us it's possible that your details are incorrect OR your computer is treating our emails as SPAM. To overcome this, you need to check your **Junk Mail Folder** and if you find an email in there from us you will need **to right-click on the message**, then click on **Junk Email** and select **Add sender to safe senders list**, this should overcome the SPAM issue.

We are aware that at the time of the CMC affiliation renewal each year (31st December), your club's details may well be correct. However, your contact details and / or the details of your Executive Committee may change during the year for various reasons.

In order to assist your club with handover to a new committee, or Public Officer we offer a few suggestions below.

We sincerely hope that your kind assistance with this issue will alleviate some of the discrepancies, which appear each year in our records, and will allow us to keep you informed of important issues in a timely manner.

In order that RMS records for your club are kept up to date, the Council suggests that the details regarding any Executive Committee changes should also be advised to the Roads & Maritime Service as soon as possible. (This service has been relocated from Grafton. Please call the RMS or visit their website for details). This is especially important if your club has vehicles on HCRS. Failure to inform them may result in an application for registration being refused.

You must also advise NSW Fair Trading (13 32 20) of your Public Officer and/or address changes.


